Peace & Security Labs

The International Peace and Security Institute (IPSI) will support a select number of innovative student projects sparked by the 2010 Bologna Symposium on Conflict Prevention, Resolution, and Reconciliation. These projects will be used by participants to test new and pioneering approaches to peacebuilding, and will be utilized in the future to drive the evolution of IPSI's training curriculum.

IPSI is offering micro-seed grants of USD 500 to USD 5,000 in support of successful proposals (a total of USD 5,000 will be distributed).

Your proposal must be socially entrepreneurial, sustainable, pioneering, and designed to positively affect peace and security in a community, a country, or the world.

You will receive further instructions at the start of the Symposium.



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Academic Credit Students

Students seeking one unit of academic credit from SAIS must complete all of the following requirements:

- 1) Attend and actively participate in all discussion sessions for the entire four week period.
- 2) Complete all assigned readings for the symposium as well as supplemental readings assigned by SAIS faculty.
- 3) Complete three short theme papers (4-5 pages each, 1200-1500 words) covering each of the first three weeks' sessions on prevention, resolution, and reconciliation. Each paper should identify a significant problem of interest to the student arising from the sessions for each week and develop an analytical essay about the problem, utilizing materials from guest lectures, discussion sessions, and assigned readings. These papers are due on the Monday following each of the first three weeks, i.e., 28 June, 5 and 12 July, and a hard copy should be submitted to the symposium office and by email to Professors Zartman and Hopmann at zartman@jhu.edu and pthopmann@jhu.edu.
- 4) A term paper should be submitted following the symposium, no later than Monday 19 July, to Professors Zartman and Hopmann at the email addresses above. This paper should be about 20 double-spaced pages in length (i.e., approximately 5000 words) and should analyze a specific case of conflict, either inter-state or intra-state, in relation to an important analytical framework or approach covered in this symposium. The paper should begin with a definition of the problem under investigation and a brief summary of current knowledge relevant to the problem, i.e., diagnosing the nature or type of conflict under investigation. It should then present a hypothesis or argument that might explain how a violent conflict might be prevented, resolved, or how a reconciliation process may be invoked. This should be followed by a brief summary of the actual case study, utilizing resources available in the SAIS library or on-line, applying the analytical framework throughout the exposition of the case. It should conclude with an analysis regarding how well the case study supports or contradicts the initial hypothesis, concluding with lessons for future conflict management practice.

Grades will be assigned according to the usual SAIS criteria, based on participation in the symposium (about 20% overall) plus an evaluation of the three theme papers (10% each) and the final term paper (constituting 50% of the final grade).

Betty BIGOMBE

Chief Mediator between the LRA and the Government of Uganda

Ms. Bigombe has been involved in peace negotiations in Uganda to end the Lord's Resistance Army's (LRA) insurgency since the early 1990s. A former Member of Ugandan Parliament, Ms. Bigombe was appointed by Uganda's President Yoweri Museveni to serve as Minister of State for Pacification of Northern Uganda, tasked with persuading the LRA rebels to give up their arms and end the fighting. During the height of the conflict in 1993, Ms. Bigombe initiated contact with rebel leader Joseph Kony. This initiative gave birth to what would become known as the "Bigombe Talks", which brought the LRA and government ministers face to face for the first time. In 1994, Ms. Bigombe was named "Uganda's Woman of the Year" for her efforts to end the country's violence.

Since the official collapse of the peace talks in 1994, Ms. Bigombe—who is one among the few individuals with credibility among both rebel and government forces—has continued to urge and facilitate engagement between key individuals on all sides of the conflict with a view toward achieving a peaceful resolution. Ms. Bigombe has also been a consultant in the Social Protection, Human Development and Post Conflict Units at the World Bank, and she has also been called upon to assist with peace negotiations in the Sudan.

In 1997, Ms. Bigombe received an AAI-administered Partners for International Education and Training (PIET) fellowship. She attended the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, where she earned a master's degree in public administration. She holds a bachelor's degree from Makerere University in Uganda. She has co-authored several articles on post-conflict peace-building and the impact of armed conflict on women and children.



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Mayra BUVINIC

Sector Director, Gender and Development Group, The World Bank



Mayra Buvinic, a Chilean national and internationally respected expert on gender and social development, is the Bank's senior spokesperson on gender and development issues. Before joining the Bank in 2005, she was Chief of the Social Development Division at the Inter-American Development Bank and the IDB's Special Advisor on Violence Prevention. Prior to this, Ms. Buvinic was a founding member and President of the International Center for Research on Women (ICRW). She has published in the areas of poverty and gender, employment promotion, small enterprise development, reproductive health and, more recently, violence reduction.

Ms. Buvinic holds a Ph.D. and a master's degree, both in social psychology, from the University of Wisconsin.

Gareth EVANS

President Emeritus, International Crisis Group (ICG); Co-Chair of the International Commission on Nuclear Non-Proliferation and Disarmament



Gareth Evans is President Emeritus of the International Crisis Group, which he served as President and CEO from January 2000 to June 2009. He previously spent 21 years in Australian politics, thirteen of them as a Cabinet Minister. As Foreign Minister (1988-96) he was best known internationally for his role in developing the UN peace plan for Cambodia, helping conclude the Chemical Weapons Convention, and helping initiate new Asia Pacific regional economic and security architecture. He has written or edited nine books - most recently *The Responsibility to Protect: Ending Mass Atrocity Crimes Once and for All*, published in September 2008 - and has published over 100 journal articles and chapters on foreign relations, human rights and legal and constitutional reform.

He was Co-Chair of the International Commission on Intervention and State Sovereignty (2001), and a member of the UN Secretary General's High Level Panel on Threats, Challenges and Change (2004), the Blix Commission on Weapons of Mass Destruction (2006), the Zedillo Commission of Eminent Persons on The Role of the IAEA to 2020 and Beyond (2008) and the UN Secretary-General's Advisory Committee on Genocide Prevention. He is Co-Chair of the International Advisory



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Board of the Global Centre for the Responsibility to Protect. In June 2008, he was appointed to co-chair (with former Japanese Foreign Minister Yoriko Kawaguchi) the International Commission on Nuclear Non-Proliferation and Disarmament, and now works from Australia as an Honorary Professorial Fellow at the University of Melbourne.

Among other current positions, Gareth Evans is Chair of the World Economic Forum's Global Governance Initiative Peace and Security Expert Group; a Fellow of the Foreign Policy Association; a member of the International Council of the Asia Society; a member of the International Advisory Board of the Pew Global Attitudes Survey.

Born in 1944, he holds first class honors degrees in Law from Melbourne University (BA, LLB (Hons)) and in Politics, Philosophy and Economics from Oxford University (MA). Before entering the Australian Parliament in 1978, he was an academic lawyer specializing in constitutional and civil liberties law and a barrister specializing in industrial law. He became a Queens Counsel (QC) in 1983.

David FRANCIS

Director of Africa Center for Peace & Conflict Studies, University of Bradford



David J. Francis is the Founder and Director of the Africa Centre for Peace and Conflict Studies in the Department of Peace Studies and holds the UNESCO Chair of African Peace and Conflict Studies at the University of Bradford. His main research focus is on the peace-security-conflict-development nexus in transition societies in Sub-Saharan Africa. He consults widely for a range of institutions and development co-operation partners as well as African governments and agencies. His recent publications include 'Uniting Africa: Building Regional Peace and Security Systems' Ashgate, 2006 and 'Peace and Conflict in Africa' Zed Books, 2008.



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Klaas GLENEWINKEL

CEO, Media in Cooperation and Transition (mict)



Klaas Glenewinkel is the director of Media in Cooperation and Transition (MICT), a non-profit organization that specializes in the training of journalists and media producers as well as program and content development.

MICT's current focus is Iraq and Sudan where the organization runs a variety of media activities including websites (<http://www.niqash.org> and <http://www.sudanvotes.org>), supports a journalist network for the production and dissemination of print and radio reports and conducts trainings. MICT has also released various publications on the Iraqi cultural and media sectors. The Organization is based in Berlin with representatives in Iraq and Sudan.

Björn Hofmann is an independent co-trainer in negotiation skills. Following his studies in International Relations with a focus on International Law at Dresden University, he was awarded an M.Litt with distinction in International Security Studies from the University of St. Andrews in 2007. After his studies, Björn became a Fellow in the 2007/2008 Postgraduate Programme in International Affairs and worked on crisis prevention and conflict management in Berlin, Nepal, New Zealand and East Timor. 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P. Terrence HOPMANN

***Professor of International Relations; Director of the Conflict Management Program, Johns Hopkins University SAIS
Co-Academic Coordinator, IPSI***

Dr. Terrence Hopmann was a professor of political science and chair of the Political Science Department at Brown University, where he also was director of the Global Security Program of the Thomas J. Watson Jr. Institute of International Studies, the Center for Foreign Policy Development and the International Relations Program. He served in political science department at the University of Minnesota and became the director of its Harold Scott Quigley Center for International Studies.

Dr. Hopmann also served as vice president of the International Studies Association and program chair of three ISA international meetings. He also held the position of editor of the International Studies Quarterly. Dr. Hopmann was a Fulbright Fellow four times: twice in Belgium and twice in Austria. He was a senior fellow at the United States Institute of Peace and the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. His main research focuses on the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe.

He holds a Ph.D. in Political Science from Stanford University.



Amb. Jacques Paul KLEIN

Former Special Representative of the Secretary-General and Coordinator of United Nations Operations in Liberia

Mr. Jacques Paul Klein, of the United States of America, was named by the United Nations Secretary-General, Kofi Annan, as Special Representative of the Secretary-General and Coordinator of United Nations Operations in Liberia in July 2003.

Mr. Klein was a career member of the Senior Foreign Service of the Department of State. In July 1997, the Government of the United States nominated and the Dayton Peace implementation Council's Steering Board approved the selection of Mr. Klein as Principal Deputy High Representative for Bosnia and Herzegovina with the Office of the High Representative. In August 1999, United Nations Secretary-General Kofi Annan announced the selection of Mr. Klein as Special



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Representative of the Secretary-General and Coordinator of United Nations Operations in Bosnia and Herzegovina with the rank of Under-Secretary-General.

Mr. Klein has been awarded the Department of State's Distinguished Honor Award, as well as three Superior and Meritorious Honor Awards. He also received the Secretary of Defense Medal for Outstanding Public Service, as well as the Department of the Air Force's Awards for Exceptional and Meritorious Civilian Service.

He received his undergraduate and graduate degrees in history from Roosevelt University in Chicago, Illinois and has done post-graduate work in International Politics at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. In recognition of his service to peace, he has also been awarded an Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws by Elmhurst College.

Norbert KUNZ

Social Entrepreneurship Expert; Chief Executive Officer, iq consult



Norbert Kunz is one of the highest-profile social entrepreneurs in Germany. For 20 years he has advised and supported entrepreneurs, companies, and non-profit organizations in developing their business models, financial plans, and organizational structures. As CEO of iq consult he contributed greatly to a number of pilot projects, including the development of:

- the German car-sharing system
- the national pilot project for the modularization of professional training in Germany
- a number of projects to strengthen the local economy (village development and mentoring programs, among others)
- integrated start-up consulting services for disadvantaged target groups (the handicapped, young unemployed people, and minorities) and for social entrepreneurs
- the first German microfinance model, which was the inspiration for the development of the German microfinance system



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In 2006, the Federal Ministry of Labor and Social Affairs named him a national expert in the “Community of Practice on Inclusive Entrepreneurship”. Furthermore, between 1992 and 2009, he was the CEO of a small television production company that produced around 150 documentaries, primarily with sociocritical, political, and cultural themes. Mr. Kunz is a member of the board of the Verband Deutscher Gründungsinitiativen e.V. (Association of German Entrepreneurial Initiatives) and of the organization Hilfe für Menschen in Not e.V. (Help for People in Need). Norbert Kunz has received awards from ASHOKA and the Schwab Foundation, and iq consult and its projects have received numerous awards from the Bertelsmann Foundation, the Committee for Sustainability, the Federal Ministry of Labor and Social Affairs, the Federal Ministry of Economics and Technology, and the European Union.

Jeffrey MAPENDERE

Senior Advisor, United Nations Mediation Support Unit’s Standby Team of Experts



Jeffrey Mapendere is a mediation expert who has worked in several countries on peace processes, security arrangements, and elections. Currently he serves on the United Nations Mediation Support Unit’s Standby Team of Experts as a Senior Advisor for Security Arrangements. Other previous appointments are: Carter Center Field Office Director for the International Elections Observation Program in Sudan; Executive Director of the Canadian International Institute of Applied Negotiation (CIAN); and Assistant Director in the Conflict Resolution Program at the Carter Center in Atlanta, Georgia, USA. His experience spans more than thirty years in the area of armed conflicts starting as a guerrilla in the Zimbabwe liberation struggle, an officer in the Zimbabwe National Army (ZNA), and an international peacemaker. Mapendere has a deep understanding of rebel groups, and has worked with various armed movements. He holds an MA in Conflict Analysis and Management.



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John MARKS

President and Founder, Search for Common Ground



John Marks is President and founder of Search for Common Ground, an international conflict prevention NGO headquartered in Washington and Brussels, with offices in 18 countries. He also founded and heads Common Ground Productions, which produces radio and television programming around the world to help prevent and transform conflict. He wrote and produced The Shape of the Future series of TV documentaries, which was aired simultaneously on Israeli, Palestinian, and Arab satellite television - something that had never been done before. He is a best-selling, award-winning author and in 2006 was awarded a Skoll Fellowship for Social Entrepreneurship.

Susan Collin MARKS

Senior Vice President, Search for Common Ground



Susan Collin Marks is the senior vice president of Search for Common Ground. She is a South African who served as a peacemaker and peacebuilder during South Africa's transition from apartheid to democracy. Her book, *Watching the Wind: Conflict Resolution during South Africa's Transition to Democracy* (USIP, Washington DC, 2000) was also published in Arabic.

She serves on numerous boards, including the Advisory Council of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars Project on Leadership, and as Vice Chair of the Board of the Abraham Path Initiative. She is the founding editor of *Track Two*, a quarterly publication on community and political conflict resolution. She was portrayed in the PBS documentary *Women on the Frontlines*. In 2006, she launched the Leadership Wisdom Initiative to offer leadership development and one-on-one support and coaching to political, institutional and civil society leaders. Honors include a 1994/5 Jennings Randolph Peace Fellowship at the United States Institute for Peace, the Institute for Noetic Science's Creative Altruism award in 2005, and a Skoll Fellowship for Social Entrepreneurship in 2006. She speaks, teaches, coaches, mentors, writes, facilitates, and supports peace processes and conflict resolution programs internationally.



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Luis MORENO-OCAMPO

Prosecutor, International Criminal Court

Luis Moreno-Ocampo, Prosecutor of the International Criminal Court since June 2003, began his career as a prosecutor in Argentina. After graduating from the University of Buenos Aires Law School in 1978, he rose to prominence after serving as the assistant prosecutor in the Military Juntas trial, in which military officials and former heads of state were charged with the murder, kidnapping, and torture of as many as 30,000 people known as the desaparecidos, or "the disappeared". These Argentine citizens, made up primarily of trade-unionists, students, and activists, were persecuted by the military dictatorship of Jorge Rafael Videla in an effort to eradicate left-wing opposition. Moreno-Ocampo also prosecuted the military leaders accused of malpractice in the Falklands War, as well as the guerilla leaders of two military rebellions in Argentina. He has also litigated in dozens of major corruption cases and served as Prosecutor of the Federal Criminal Court of Buenos Aires.

He established his own private firm, Moreno-Ocampo & Wortman Jofre, in 1992, which dealt primarily with corruption as well as criminal and human rights law. In addition, he took several cases concerning political bribery, protection of journalists, and freedom of expression. During this time, Moreno-Ocampo was also the president of Transparency International, an anti-corruption NGO, for Latin America and the Caribbean. He went on to serve as Associate Professor of Criminal Law at the University of Buenos Aires and as a visiting professor at Stanford University and Harvard Law School. He also served as a consultant for the World Bank and United Nations before being elected, unopposed, into a nine-year term as the ICC's first prosecutor.



Joyce NEU

***Founder and Senior Associate, Facilitating Peace;
Former Team Leader, The United Nations Standby Team of Mediation Experts***

Joyce Neu is the Founder and a Senior Associate of Facilitating Peace, a consulting network offering services in peacemaking and peacebuilding. Neu has been engaged in conflict assessment, mediation, facilitation, evaluation, and advising at the official and/or unofficial level for 20 years in sub-Saharan Africa, the Balkans, the Baltics, the Caucasus, and



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Cyprus.

Neu has consulted on the role of women in peace processes and has conducted gender assessments for the UN and the Norwegian Agency for Development Assistance. She has advised on peacemaking concerns with the UN, the International Criminal Court, and the Norwegian Foreign Ministry.

In her former capacity as team leader of a new United Nations' Standby Team of Mediation Experts, she advised Special Envoys of the Secretary-General on peace processes in the Central African Republic, Comoros, Kenya, and Somalia. In 2000, Neu became the founding executive director of the Joan B. Kroc Institute for Peace & Justice at the University of San Diego; prior to that, she was Senior Associate Director of the Conflict Resolution Program at The Carter Center, advising former President Jimmy Carter on conflicts in more than two dozen countries and leading mediation efforts on his behalf with heads of state and opposition groups in the Republic of Congo, Mali, Sudan and Uganda.

Neu has published articles on conflict resolution, negotiations, and intercultural communication and has given talks and conducted trainings around the world. She has taught at the University of Southern California, Penn State University, Adam Mickiewicz University (Poznan, Poland), Emory University, and the University of San Diego. Neu was a senior Fulbright scholar in Poland and a Peace Corps volunteer in Senegal. She received her Ph.D. in linguistics from the University of Southern California and her B.A. from the University of Colorado.

Maureen O'BRIEN

Founder, Managing Director, LINC Negotiation Architects



Maureen O'Brien is a founder and Managing Director of LINC. In this role, Ms. O'Brien coordinates with LINC staff on project development, conducts negotiation training and writes and edits negotiation simulations. Mostly recently Ms. O'Brien co-wrote the simulation *Placing the Displaced*, which the United Institute of Peace purchased for its course training practitioners on conflict resolution. Ms. O'Brien also co-wrote the simulation *Harnessing Energy* for the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council to explore environmental conflict. The subject matter is particularly relevant to Ms. O'Brien's other professional capacity in the Corporate Social Responsibility field.



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Ahmedou OULD- ABDALLAH

Special Representative of the UN Secretary-General in Somalia



Ahmedou Ould-Abdallah has devoted himself to African development and conflict management throughout his career. Between 1969 and 1984 he held several posts with the Mauritanian government, including foreign minister, ambassador to the US and the European Union. In 1984 he began work within the UN as the special coordinator for Africa and the least developed countries, and from 1993 to 1995 Ould-Abdallah was the special representative of the UN Secretary-General in Burundi. He has authored many publications, including 'La Diplomatie Pytomane' (1996) and 'Burundi on the Brink' (2000). He has been Executive Secretary for the Global Coalition for Africa, a forum for promoting political and economic reforms. He is a Member of the International Advisory Board, Center for Ethics, Justice and Public Life, Brandeis University. He has served as special representative of the UN Secretary-General in West Africa based in Dakar and now holds the position for special representative in Somalia.

John PRENDERGAST

Co-Founder, the Enough Project



John Prendergast is an author and human rights activist who for over 25 years has worked for peace in Africa. He is Co-Founder of the Enough Project, an initiative to end genocide and crimes against humanity. During the Clinton administration, John was involved in a number of peace processes in Africa while he was Director of African Affairs at the National Security Council and Special Advisor to Susan Rice at the Department of State. John has also worked for two members of Congress, UNICEF, Human Rights Watch, the International Crisis Group, and the U.S. Institute of Peace. He has also been a youth counselor, a basketball coach and a Big Brother for over 25 years.

With Tracy McGrady and other NBA stars, John co-founded the Darfur Dream Team Sister Schools Program to fund schools in Darfurian refugee camps and create partnerships with schools in the United States. He also helped create the Raise Hope for Congo Campaign, highlighting the issue of conflict minerals that fuel the war in Congo. John is a board member and serves as Strategic Advisor to Not On Our Watch, the organization founded by George Clooney, Matt Damon, Don Cheadle, and Brad Pitt.



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John has been a visiting professor at the University of San Diego, Eckerd College, St. Mary's College, the University of Maryland, and the American University in Cairo, and will be at Columbia University and the University of Pittsburgh. He has been awarded six honorary doctorates.



Valerie ROSOUX

***Research Fellow, Belgian National Fund for Scientific Research (FNRS);
Professor of International Negotiation at University of Louvain***

Valérie Rosoux has a PhD from the University of Louvain (UCL), Belgium, in International Relations. She graduated in Political Sciences and Philosophy. She is a research fellow at the Belgian National Fund for Scientific Research (FNRS) and teaches International Negotiation at UCL. Her main research interest is memory and Conflict Resolution. Her latest publications concern the Rwandan, Franco-German and Franco-Algerian cases. She is the author of several books and articles about the transformation of relations between former belligerents, the latest of which are: "The Unforgiving. Reflections on the Resistance to Forgiveness after Atrocity", *Law and Contemporary Problems*, 2009, vol. 72, pp. 101-117; "Réconcilier: ambitions et pièges de la justice transitionnelle. Dan Smith is the Secretary General of International Alert and Chairman of the UN Peacebuilding Fund's Advisory Group. Previous positions include Director of the International Peace Research Institute, Oslo (1993-2001) and Director of the Transnational Institute, Amsterdam (1991-3). Fellowships include the Norwegian Nobel Institute (2001) and the Hellenic Foundation for Foreign and European Policy (2003). Honorary positions include Chairman of the Institute for War & Peace Reporting (1992-2006).

Dan has researched and written on peace, conflict and security issues since the mid-1970s. In all he has authored, co-authored, edited or co-edited 16 books including successive editions of *The State of the World Atlas* (latest edition 2008) and *The State of the Middle East*. Alvaro de SOTO

Senior Fellow, Ralph Bunche Institute



Alvaro de Soto held senior positions at the UN for 25 years under Secretaries-General Perez de Cuellar, Boutros-Ghali and Annan. He led the 1990-1991 negotiations which resulted in peace accords providing for far-reaching reforms to end the 10-year war in El Salvador. In 1999 he put together guidelines for UN Envoys, issued by Secretary-General Annan, regarding human rights questions in peace negotiations. He conducted the 1999-2004 process which led to the April 2004 referendums on a comprehensive settlement plan for the Cyprus problem. He was Special Envoy for Myanmar (1995-1999) and Special Representative for the Western Sahara (2003-2005). He left the UN in May 2007 after two years as the chief UN Middle East envoy. He holds the rank of Ambassador in the Peruvian Diplomatic Service. He is currently a Senior Fellow at the Ralph Bunche Institute, an Associate Fellow at the Geneva Centre for Security Policy and a member of the



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Global Leadership Foundation. At Columbia University he hosts “Conversations with Alvaro de Soto,” a series of public interviews with senior negotiators and mediators.

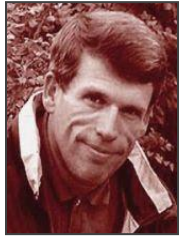
